Ian Ritchie Redpath - the Two Blues infinitely Precious Antique

Lots of folk around Geelong have Ian Redpath stories, including those who live to tell the tales, stretching back to his schoolboy days.

His family, owners of the famous Redpath Mills, are part of local history, while their scion is part of global cricket history, renowned as one of the toughest and bravest ever to play the game.

John Craven found enough of those stories to dedicate a whole chapter to Redpath in his magnum opus, The Conquerors, rating him at number six in his list of the region's finest ever sports products.

When Redpath was, somewhat belatedly, installed into the Australian Cricket Hall of Fame this year, Gideon Haigh, Australia's greatest living cricket writer, so able to tell another tale, wrote a magnificent tribute to his fellow Geelongian in his former newspaper, The Australian: "Growing up in Geelong in the 1970s, it was hard to miss the shopfront, with its earthen shade and white lettering. Redpath Antiques: it was where our Test cricketer worked, in those days when Test cricketers lived and worked among us, rather than roaming the globe in their gilded chariots.

"Even then, Ian Redpath looked a bit of an antique himself, with his smooth chin, bowl cut, and spare 70kg frame, all Adam's apple, ears and elbows, amid all the mushrooming moustaches and brawny forearms.

"My favourite fact about him: Redders was the last Australian to play Test cricket for nothing, foregoing a fee during his maiden Test summer 60 years ago so as not to compromise his football career with Geelong Amateurs. He wrote a column in the *Geelong Advertiser* and he drove a Torana, although on the morning of a Melbourne Test or Sheffield Shield match he would catch the 8.45am train from Geelong's rambling 1870s railway station."

Redders is always "Reddily" acknowledged in another magnum opus – Barnso's Bible – listed as one of the Two Blues to have gone on to play first-class then Test cricket. Lindsay Hassett is the other, well among Australian Two Blues.

Gooch/Insole Scholarship holder Dan Lawrence has played for England at Test level, and if Nasser Hussain is any judge, Ronnie McKenna will too.

Professor Daryl Tucker, one of the inaugurals of his generation in the first ever batch of NCCC juniors, has his share of Ian Redpath stories and can bear witness to his qualification as a Two Blue.

It was around 1954, as the Queens Park Oval was being reclaimed from riverside scrub.

"I was part of the first junior team at Newtown and David Shaw was my first coach," Professor Tucker told the Two Blue Tribune.

"I was a contemporary of Ian Redpath's. He went one way with cricket, I went the other way."

That other way for Daryl includes becoming one of Australia's most respected chemists, holding senior academic positions around the world until he ended up back in his hometown as the Dean of Science at Deakin University where he helped the University establish its modern research profile.

In and among all that, he watched with delight Ian Redpath go from talented schoolboy to champion Test cricketer via the path pioneered by Hassett – South Melbourne, Victoria, Australia.

"I remember Ian Redpath as being very shy, he was never one to blow his own trumpet, even though it was obvious what a fine cricketer he was," Professor Tucker said.

"He is under-rated in Australia cricket, more among the general public.

"His team-mates I believe though, always had the highest opinion of him."

One of those team-mates is Greg Chappell who lives to tell the tale, despite the best efforts of England poet/fast bowler John Snow.

In the Ashes summer of 1970/71 Snow, all poetry and raw emotion - was revelling in the bounce of the WACA Ground and dining out on the Australia top-order, knocking over Bill Lawry for a duck, Keith Stackpole for five and Ian Chappell for 50.

Doug Walters and Paul Sheahan also fell to the English bowlers as Greg Chappell joined Redders with the score 5-107 in reply to England's first innings of 397.

Redders met Chappell in the middle in a way that many - including Chappell – believe said "young 'un you stay down this end and leave Snowie to me".

Ian Redpath scored 171 and Greg Chappell – after taking a long while to get his first run but refusing to give another inch to the English - made a century on debut to begin one of the most elegant careers in Australian Test history.

Redpath was unbeaten in Australia's second innings after what looked like inevitable defeat became a draw.

Though Ian Redpath has never confirmed it publicly, Greg Chappell reckons he protected him from facing John Snow.

"I have always said we all would die for a baggy green cap but only a few who would kill for it and Redders was one of them," Greg Chappell told the Two Blue Tribune when reminded of that moment.

"He got his runs when it was toughest.

"I can still see him facing John Snow that day and him ducking and weaving out of the way of bouncer after bouncer and glaring back down the pitch at Snow. It was just incredible Test cricket.

"lan's example at the other end made me feel that if it meant that much to him to keep his wicket intact then I had better make sure I try jut as hard to keep mine intact.

"Fortunately, we both succeeded and our partnership put is in a sound position.

"But from my point of view, I had received an invaluable lesson in what Test match batting is all about from one of the most courageous batsmen ever to player for Australia."

"Redders was just such a great competitor. I'm not sure I played with any player who enjoyed a win more or who hated losing more.

"He was not really a drinker or a smoker yet I can't recall a win where he did not have a drink or a smoke in his hand."

After Ian Redpath retired, as well as working in the antiques store, he had a stint as coach of Victoria, famously upsetting Dirk Wellham, a story a young woman sitting on the fence nearly didn't live to tell.

Customers entering the antique shop would find him emerging from out the back covered in saw dust and if one of them happened to want to chat about cricket as much as old furniture, Redders would happily oblige, fully of the carefully considered thoughts arrived at as he patiently planed at ancient timbers.

Shy as he was as a schoolboy, as a grown man he had his well-formed opinions and if the moment needed it, he could offer them with a fair measure of force.

In a different time in Australian cricket, sport generally, the participants were expected to tug the forelock to the administrators, and all for a pittance.

When a few cricketers began to grumble about the amount they were being paid, a bloke by the name of Alan Barnes, the secretary of the Australian Cricket Board, reckoned if the current players didn't like their pay and conditions, he could find 500,000 people willing to take their place.

About the same time, Barnes then made the mistake of going into the Australian dressing room where Redders was waiting for him.

There are varying accounts of the tone and content of the conversation - largely a one-way exchange – in which Redpath pointed out the obvious, most of that 500,000 might not be very good.

Barnes retreated; Redpath became one of the signatories to World Series Cricket, changing the game, and the pay scale, forever. An injury in a World Series Cricket game in at Kardinia Park ended lan's serious playing days, though Greg Wells ran him out when he agreed to play in an exhibition match — another story.

Now like Professor Tucker, into his 80s, Ian Redpath remains generally shy and humble.

His response to his induction into the Hall of Fame was typical.

"It's come as a great shock, but it's very nice of them," he said. "I've just been very fortunate."

"I thought they were pulling my leg. Some of the fellows who are in it: I don't know if I was at their standard, but it's lovely to be recognised."

And so, Ian Ritchie Redpath becomes an infinitely precious antique among the all the shiny bright, ephemeral, plasticky stuff that is the Big Bash.

And as he has since his teenage days, he remains the much-loved character the Two Blues will forever proudly claim as one of their own.

As well as talking with Kamila about her wines, you can chatendlessly if you wish - about cricket. She's from Grenada, personal friend of the likes of Viv, oops, she corrects, Sir Viv. Drop a name, she drops two back. I'll match your Clive with my Curtley and Courtney.

As for wines "if you're looking for Californian wines, we have some very good ones". We were looking for good Californian wines, have been ever since the 1976 Judgement of Paris. (Alan Rickman starred in the movie about same, worth watching as a quick way to get up to speed on the tectonic shift in the attitude to American wine-making, particularly among the French.)

You can find the same heady mix of richly stocked wine shelves and a bit of cricket in Geelong, Geelong West in fact, Pakington Street. It's a little bit of New York in Geelong, or perhaps Kamila's is a little bit of Geelong in New York.

Whatever, it's where the president's cousin Nick has his shop, Winepress, now, one senses with a kinsman twisting his arm a bit, a club sponsor.



Nick is no great cricketing name-dropper, apart from Tom's, but he does have Californian wines, or had until we cleaned him out last Friday. He promises to get more.

Winepress was also the Radio National Breakfast Show team's choice when buying their sports presenter fine wine and champers for his 70th. Hand-delivered by this big tall guy with a mop of ginger.



What a way to find out about what was then a relatively new business.

Nick continued to deliver our purchases, if he said he was going to be there at 9.45, he would be there at 9.45. With that timing, he could have worked at RN Breakfast - and now it's time for the news.
